Clase teorica sobre las short stories y los elementos fundamentales en ellas.

Introduccion a la short story The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde by Robert Louis Stevenson en power point.

Chapters 1 and 2 review. Continuamos con la lectura de la short story.

- Analisis de los personajes: Mr. Utterson (The Lawyer) and Mr. Enfield (The Man of the Town) and the importance of their walks.
- What does the contrast between the clean street and the ugly door suggest about the person who uses that door? (Think about social reputation vs. secret activities.)
- Mr. Enfield mentions that the house itself is on a square, but the door leads to a courtyard and a part of the building that seems separate. What does this architecture—a main house on a square and a back door in a side street—tell you about the person's desire to keep his two lives separate?
- The text says Hyde was "not acting like a man—more like a mindless machine" when he hurt the girl. What is more frightening to the witnesses: the fact that he was violent, or the fact that he was calm and unfeeling? Explain your choice.
